

Our Story

The independent history of the Wesselényi Miklós Technical Secondary School and Student Hostel of Nyíregyháza Vocational Training Centre began in 1969, when the previously merged Industrial Vocational Training Institute No. 110 and Local Industrial School No. 113 split again on September 1, 1968, due to the significant increase in student numbers. The professions taught at the local industrial school were transferred to the 107th Industrial Vocational Training Institute. The school gained full financial and administrative independence, which meant complete separation, on January 1, 1969. The current name of the institution was formed after several changes of management and name.

It moved to its current location in 1974, and the building complex expanded to include a hostel and a central workshop over the years. In the early 2010s, the main building was completely renovated - through a tender - and a sports hall was constructed as well. Our school, the Wesselényi Miklós Technical Secondary School and Student Hostel - together with nine other vocational training institutions - has been operating as part of the Nyíregyháza Vocational Training Centre since July 1, 2015, and is one of the most dynamically developing institutions, which provides vocational training services to approximately 1,000-1,200 people from the settlements of Szabolcs-Szatmár-Bereg county (or to a lesser extent from the south-eastern part of Borsod-Abaúj-Zemplén county and the northern part of Hajdu-Bihar county) with approximately 100 full-time and part-time instructors. The school is located in a well-frequented area, is easily accessible by public transport, and meets the legal requirements for a barrier-free built environment.

In addition to the central building and workshop, vocational training is conducted at two other locations (Univerzum – Beauty sector, Hengersor – Wood industry sector), which currently provides high-quality education to nearly a thousand students. Our school has a unique educational profile, and our range of training programmes is extremely extensive: therefore, young people who have completed their compulsory education and adults who wish to learn can choose from a wide range of training programs, according to their knowledge, abilities and opportunities.
